January is our first month back. There will be no culture class, but the **sales table** is operating for sale of members plants and for small quantities of pots etc. There will also be the usual **monthly raffle**.

There will be **no guest speaker, but instead, we will hold one of our regular “Plant Doctor” nights** where we set up Plant Doctor panels at each end of the hall and rearrange the chairs. If you have an orchid you are worried about, perhaps one that just isn't growing well or one that is going backwards, and you are not sure what to do next, this is your chance to get some advice from our experienced growers. Bring it along to the meeting for the experts to assess.

It is always an amazing process in itself to watch what they look at in the plant being assessed. Their process reveals much about what you should look for in your plants, what various ‘symptoms’ mean, and **why** they mean it.

Let the experts show you what they are seeing and what they think it may imply. They can usually give you some practical suggestions for changes to your culture and/or some immediate action that needs to be taken. There are no limits on the number of plants you may bring in but if there are large numbers, the doctors reserve the right to prioritise which ‘patients’ they see on the night

## **Best of the Evening Hybrid (Dec 2023) – Miltoniopsis Breathless ‘Brilliant’ - grown by Loretta and Paul Au**



(write up by JR) Welcome to the Open Category Loretta and Paul – and what an entry. This plant was certainly true to its name as it was absolutely breathtaking, as were the other Miltoniopsis' benched by Loretta and Paul on the night.

With a reputation for being a little difficult to grow, it goes to show if you take the time to research their needs and give them what they want, the rewards are nothing short of stunning.

Miltoniopsis Breathless is a hybrid originated in 2005 by Okika, it is a cross between Mps. Pink Lady x Mps. Pearl Ono.

Loretta and Paul won the Novice BOE last month with Mps. Hawaiian Swizzle ‘Red Bull’ and with Mps. Breathless ‘Beauty’ back in February 2023. There have been various articles in our bulletin on growing Miltoniopsis so we won't repeat any of that here. Perhaps the most comprehensive article was the one in Sept 2019 by Victorian nurseryman Craig Miles. 

used, especially if entering data for 120 to 150 plants each month. All fonts have been increased in size. The **Class** line has been reduced in size since it only requires the class number which is located on yellow class cards located on the benches at each meeting. The **Genus** line is the same size, and the **Plant Name** line has been increased to two lines to accommodate long names, such as those used with hybrids. The **Exhibitor's Name** heading has been replaced with **Member(s)** and is still one line. The **red square** is for use by judges when they allocate 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> or 3<sup>rd</sup>. The example given is for a hybrid orchid that Janine and I have submitted previously which was awarded



2<sup>nd</sup> place for its class.

The selection below can't cover everyone but there were **many old friends and very happy faces** as usual.








#### **The Christmas spirit – by Jenny Richardson**



A woman walked into the kitchen to find her husband stalking around the room with a fly swatter.


"What are you doing?" She asked. -- "Hunting Flies", He responded.

## Vale Bernie Britton - (passed away Nov 2023)



Bernie was a long-time popular member of both the North Shore and Ku-ring-gai Orchid Societies and was instrumental in the formation of the St Ives Orchid Fair. He was an active member on the committees of both North Shore and Ku-Ring-Gai and was Chairman of the St Ives Fair committee from its foundation until 2019 when ill health led him to resign.

He was a quiet, calm man with a huge heart, and was loved by all who knew him. Whenever a special job needed to be done, Bernie was the man to put his hand up and volunteer and when teams were needed you could be sure he was on the ground pitching in with the rest. He trained as an orchid judge and despite the significant travel involved, volunteered to be one of the assigned judges to help Berowra OS judge at their meetings.

I was also a member of the Ku-ring-gai Orchid Society committee when Bernie served there and he was a popular friend to all. As well as being an orchid lover Bernie was an accomplished gardener and had a special thing for Peonies, and if you don't know what those special darlings are you should look them up. He tempted many on our committee to try and master their culture but while some have succeeded, to our shame Cynthia and I failed time after time even with Bernie's directions. You can't win them all.

Bernie was a constant influence for calm and common sense at our committee meetings and even better, was a delight to talk to about anything and everything over coffee and cake at the end of the committee meetings. I also have a special memory about Bernie and his wife Marie's participation at a series of society social dinners Cynthia and I hosted at our home about 15 years back. They were open to all society members and it just worked out that our home and large backyard made an ideal venue for an orchid houses and garden visit followed by an informal dinner, followed by a kind of pub quiz or similar to finish it off. **2. Benching Competition Results** – At our Christmas meeting, the point-score competition winners are announced and prizes handed out. We do not publish the complete results of the point-score, or the results in specific classes (i.e. the placings upon which prizes are based). There are 40 benching classes in total and the total results of over one hundred members benching in 40 classes is rather unwieldy to say the least. However, the results are not secret and if any member is interested in obtaining a copy, please send a request to [kuringgaiorchidsociety@gmail.com](mailto:kuringgaiorchidsociety@gmail.com), (the KOS email address) and we will send it to you.

What we do publish each year in our January bulletin (see below), is a summary table of the overall total points (across all classes) for about the top 20 or so point scorers in the Open division, and perhaps 5 to 10 in the Novice section. Placings in these tables are not the basis upon which prizemoney is earned or number of classes won. We

publish this table just because many members like to see where they stand competitively amongst all others.

Please, please, don't take this competition too seriously and don't get over-competitive. Let's just enjoy seeing lots of lovely orchids every month. Bring your plants in to show us your skill and to share your pride in your orchids. It's a chance to share your pleasure, your knowledge and discoveries, to see how others are doing and to ask questions.

**First, our Novice benching results** - For 2022/3 the top few in the overall scores in the Novice section (in order) were Paul and Loretta Au, Mary Mathews, Ming Chin, and Di Flinders, but not far behind were several others so our up-and-commers are a very healthy group.

However, as you should all know by now, our novice benching classes are designed to be a temporary haven for new growers and there is a mechanism for new growers to elevate from 'novice' to 'open' as their orchid culture improves and they eventually win the annual score in a number of novice classes. The process is that as you win any one class (over the full 12 months) the grower can no longer bench in that class and must bench those kinds of orchids in the equivalent Open classes. Once a novice wins 3 annual novice classes, they are no longer 'novice' and must bench all their orchids in open. (apologies for the regular repetition of these rules but there are new members every year and it takes a while for every newcomer to get to terms with all this complicated stuff).

Anyway, as a result of the 2022/3 novice competition results, the only NEW elevation from novice to open was Loretta and Paul Au who are now open in all classes.

### Best of the Evening Species – *Onc. harrisonianum* (syn *Grandiphyllum auricula*) - *grown by T and P Onslow*



(write up by JR) With quite the array of synonyms this one originates from Rio de Janeiro, Espirito Santo, Sao Paulo and Minas Gerais states of Brazil. It often grows on moss covered tree trunks as an epiphyte or sometimes as a lithophyte in forests near streams in areas that have hot dry days and cools nights with frequent dews. It grows at elevation of around 1000 meters.

Described as a miniature to small sized, cool to warm growing plant. The inflorescences are erect to arching if left un-staked and range from 12.5 to 30cm in length with up to 40 blooms per spike. As can be seen from the Onslow's plant they produce a spectacular, colorful specimen when grown well and Trevor and Pauline grow Oncidiums superbly well - another gorgeous plant.

Congratulations Trevor and Pauline. A superb specimen.

### A Mathematical analysis of Success

## Best of the Evening Novice – *Oncidium sphacelatum* grown by *Carol Blackwell*



This is one of Sydney's favourite orchids but it is a big one and can't be kept small. It has pseudobulbs up to 15 cm tall and leaves up to 60 cm long. The roots are narrow but the plant mass produces them in clusters. The average person buys their first one as a 2 or 3 bulb division and may think it will be able to be managed as a smaller plant, but sphacelatum doesn't play by the orchid grower rules.

The species *Onc. sphacelatum* is mainly from Central America in Mexico, Guatemala, Belize, El Salvador, Honduras, Nicaragua, Costa Rica but is also found as far south as Venezuela and it is in danger of becoming naturalised in Florida in the USA from cultivated plants.

The picture below (snips from a Brads Greenhouse youtube

video) is of an old plant growing on what seems to be a palm tree trunk in Mexico. It seems to be a quite old plant and you can see the nature of the close clusters of pseudobulbs forming almost a globe of growth. The second picture shows the close set nature of the large pseudobulbs.

As a virtually tropical orchid that is rarely found above 1000 m you would expect that it is a warm grower but although its habitat zones are warm, some of its habitat locations are reported to sometimes get relatively cold. Report from growers in a number of our zones, including our Sydney growers, tell

us that it doesn't seem to object to quite low degrees Celsius in Winter. What is more is that this is quite a tough orchid. Like all orchids it greatly appreciates water when it needs it and a little regular fertiliser, but this isn't one of those touchy types that turns up its toes if it doesn't always get it.

The multi branched sphacelatum spike can be close to 2 metres tall and all are covered in flowers. It makes an impressive display. We used to recommend staking the spikes upright, probably thinking that it was more impressive and manageable as a benched plant, but these days most growers allow it to arch out and weep down naturally.

Which brings me to the point that this is an orchid that naturally grows into a very big plant. It can be nice to grow and bring to show off at meetings for a few years but it is nearly impossible to keep doing it like that. This is a species much better suited to growing as a backyard landscape specimen in the same way we use out native *Dendrobium speciosum*. It adapts well to growing in a tree fork or even on the trunk. Here are some examples of sphacelatum specimens used in that way.



Now just imagine something like that flowering in your backyard every year.

As I said earlier, most grower's introduction to sphacelatum is a small division off the sales table or at a society auction. My first experience with sphacelatum was exactly that and a very similar experience to this report from an internet site called Ricardo's Blog : "The plant in the photo (at the right) started as a two pseudobulb division on top of a terracotta pot. Eventually it totally engulfed the pot with its root mass and grew over, around and under it."

I wasn't at the meeting to see Carol's orchid but the picture looks terrific. Keep it going Carol but also start thinking about a beautiful garden feature for the future.





## Back Page Humour
